THE HISTORY OF THE OFC MEN'S CHAMPIONS LEAGUE

The OFC Men's Champions League as it is now, can trace its roots back as far as the 1980s when the Oceania Club Championship was held in 1987. Reigning Australia National Soccer League champions, Adelaide City, became the inaugural champions, defeating New Zealand's Mount Wellington in the final.

The tournament was held intermittently, with Australian sides dominating up until the creation of the OFC Champions League in 2007 following Football Australia's move to the Asian Football Confederation the previous year.

Since then, New Zealand teams have won the competition on a consistent basis, with Auckland City FC holding the record of 11 titles. Waitakere United (2007 & 2008) and Team Wellington (2018) have also lifted the trophy.

Notable exceptions to New Zealand dominance came in 2010 when Papua New Guinea's Hekari United overcame Waitakere United in the final, and 2019 when two New Caledonia sides, Hienghène Sport and AS Magenta, contested the final – marking the first time in the competition's history that no New Zealand team was present.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the OFC Champions League was postponed for a two year period, with no competition held from 2019 to 2022.

When it returned, it brought with it a new format with the group stage and knockout stage now all played in a single host country, with 2022 held in New Zealand and 2023 in Vanuatu. The 2024 edition will be hosted by Tahiti.

Up until 2023, the winner of the OFC Champions League would represent OFC at the FIFA Club World Cup. From this year however, the winner will compete in the newly created FIFA Intercontinental Cup with the FIFA Club World Cup moving to a quadrennial format beginning next year, the OFC representative for which is determined by performances over a four year period.

WELLINGTON OLYMPIC AFC

After a crushing 0-1 loss in the first leg of this OFC Nationals Playoff at Kiwitea Street last week, Olympic will need to pull out all the stops and bring the results home today.

Today's match should be an exciting one from start to finish. We need our supporters to be as loud and as vocal as we were in Auckland for the National League Grand Final. Keep that bell ringing, flags flying and let our Boys in Blue know we have their backs. We are not just a Club, we're a family. Auckland City FC are no strangers to the 90 minute chanting and drums banging from their own supporters. Quite frankly, it both buoys the players and makes for an exciting game.

One thing that we can all agree is the respect we hold for Auckland City FC in doing what no other Club in New Zealand has achieved. The fact that they've won the OFC Men's Champions League 11 times is, in itself, an incredible feat, let alone getting to the FIFA Club World Cup, and we congratulate them on putting their Club and New Zealand on the football map. But we know Auckland City are not unbeatable – we bet them twice last season. Our decisive 2-0 win in the 2023 NZ National League Grand Final proves we are more than capable in bringing City to their knees. We are no longer the David to Auckland's Goliath but we are instead equals in a mighty battle. The 0-1 loss last week is not out of our reach to change the final result today.

Paul and his team have been working hard with the players to tighten the defensive line and create more attacking opportunities. There's no room for complacency. Today, it's "all or nothing", and "nothing" is just not in our resolve.



AUCKLAND CITY FC



Auckland City FC was formed in 2004 to participate in the New Zealand Football Championship's inaugural 2004-05 season under then coach Allan Jones. Nicknamed the 'Navy Blues', or simply 'City', Auckland City FC won three NZFC titles between 2004 and 2007 under Jones and then Paul Marshall, Jones also winning the club's first OFC Champions League title in 2006.

City appeared at the first of 11 FIFA Club World Cups starting in Japan 2006 where it lost to Jeonbuk Motors (0-3) and AI Ahli (0-2) and would have to wait until 2009 before it won a game at a FIFA world event after beating UAE's AI Ahli (2-0) and TP Mazembe (3-2) to clinch fifth place.

Since then the club has won nine National League titles, 11 OFC Champions League titles, three Northern League titles, the OFC President's Cup and a Chatham Cup title with over 30 players representing New Zealand, Fiji, Solomon Islands, Vanuatu or Papua New Guinea during the last 18 years.

Notable Players

Notable players to appear for City include former South African internationals Keryn Jordan and Grant Young, the most capped All White of all time, Ivan Vicelich, fellow All Whites David Mulligan, Clayton Lewis, Te Atawhai Hudson-Wihongi, Jacob Spoonley, Tamati Williams, Cam Howieson, Adam Mitchell, Sam Brotherton, Ben Sigmund and Ryan De Vries.

The highwater mark for Auckland City FC came at the 2014 FIFA Club World Cup when the Navy Blues won

a bronze medal after wins over Moghreb Tetouan (4-2 on pens), ES Setti (1-0) and Cruz Azul (1-1 - 4-3 on pens) and a narrow loss to South American champions San Lorenzo (1-2). The club's leading goalscorer of all time is Emiliano Tade who has scored 152 goals in 237 games for the club between 2011 and 2023.

International Adventures

The club participated at the OFC Champions League in Vanuatu winning the title after two nail-biting games with Ifira Black Bird and Suva FC. City played at the FIFA Club World Cup in Saudi Arabia in December last year, losing 3-0 to a star-studded Al Ittihad side that featured FIFA World Cup and UEFA Champions League winners, Karim Benzema and N'golo Kante.

2024 Season

Coach Albert Riera has added seven new faces to his squad with former England age group international Joe Ridley arriving from England, and six youngsters including Riley Sexton, goalkeeper Areya Prasad, Fiji international Nabil Begg, Oscar Duffy, Caleb Moosbally, and New Zealand age group international Stipe Ukich featuring in the club's OFC Champions League U-23 squads.
